We wish her well in the future and hope that her new garden in Bristol will give her much joy.

THE RAILWAY CHILDREN RETURNS (PG) Kilmington Village Hall



Wednesday, 14th December & Thursday, 15th Matinee

Three evacuee kids from wartime Manchester, Lily (Beau Gadsdon), Pattie (Eden Hamilton) and Ted (Zac Cudby) fetch up in exactly the same village where Roberta has apparently stayed on and is now a kindly grandmother: her daughter (Sheridan Smith) is the headteacher of the local school and has a slightly Just-William-ish son called Thomas (Austin Haynes), whose dad is away in the RAF fighting the Germans. Railway Children fans may be forgiven for wondering if any more legacy characters from the original film are going to be revived, or if we will find out if Bobbie really did marry Jim, grandson of the 'Old Gentleman' in the first tale, as seemed likely. Well, suffice it to say we discover that Bobbie became a convinced suffragette as a young woman and, on those grounds, comes very close to the blasphemy of disagreeing with Winston Churchill. Now it appears the family apparently have a kindly old uncle, or great-uncle, played by Tom Courtenay, who is something hush-hush in the War Office.

This is a film with a touch more savvy about the real world than its 1970 forebear, at least partly because it has child actors who are the same age as their characters. The now legendary scene from the first film in which Bobbie sees her daddy through the steam on the railway platform – a scene which has become more iconic than its creators ever quite envisaged – is echoed and doubled in a new dream that Lily has, in a much more serious context. And there are more shenanigans involving holding up signs to a passing train and getting it to stop. It's an amiable and ingenious tribute to the innocent, good-natured spirit of the original.

WHAT'S ON IN DECEMBER / JANUARY

KILMINGTON SKY AT NIGHT

Over the next two months several meteor showers give you a 22nd Ursid meteor shower peaks but is active from 17th to great chance to see some 'shooting stars' over Kilmington.

DECEMBER

Mars, this is the best month for viewing Mars. It can be seen during December from dusk, rising in the north-east, until dawn, setting in the north-west. It reaches its brightest point as Earth passes it in its smaller orbit. On the overnight of December 7th, the full moon slides past Mars, occulting (covering) the planet. Jupiter can be seen throughout the month in the early evening in the south-east, setting in the west around midnight. Saturn is only visible in the early evening in the south-west before it drops below the horizon. Venus is below our horizon for most of December and the only time you may glimpse it is the last couple of days at dusk, very low in the south-west just before it sets.

- Jupiter and the moon appear close.
- 6th Cassiopeid meteor shower peaks tonight but is active from 1st to 8th December. Look to the high north-north-east around 9.00 pm for your best chance to see them.
- 8th Full Moon will pass in front of Mars, creating a lunar occultation. Mars will disappear behind the Moon at 4.58 am in the western sky. Its reappearance will be visible
- 14th Geminid meteor shower peaks with as many as 120 per hour but is active from 4th to 17th December. Look to the north around 2.00 am for the best views.
- 21st Winter Solstice. The sun is at its lowest point in the sky and it's also the shortest day of the year - and the longest night.

26th December.

24th/25th Fast moving Sleigh pulled by reindeer crosses the night sky.

- 26th Saturn and the moon appear close.
- 29th Jupiter and the moon appear close.

JANUARY 2023

Mars can be seen during January from dusk, high in the east; it sets before dawn in the north-east. Jupiter can be seen throughout the month in the early evening in the westsouth-west, setting around midnight at the start of the month, getting earlier as the month progresses. Saturn is only visible in the very early evening in the south-west before it drops below the horizon, during the first couple of weeks of January. Venus can be seen for a short time each evening at dusk very low in the south-west just before it sets. You won't miss it as it is very bright.

- 3rd Mars and the moon appear close.
- 4th Quadrantid meteor shower peaks tonight with some 120 per hour however it is active from 12th December to 12th January.
- **6**th **Full Micro moon.** When a Full Moon or a New Moon coincides with apogee, the point in the Moon's orbit farthest away from Earth, the moon appears small and is known as a micro moon.
- 26th Jupiter and the moon appear close.
- 31st Mars and the moon appear close.

DID YOU KNOW?

STIR-UP SUNDAY - The last Sunday before Advent. Christmas was a great feast in the calendar. Part of the preparations involved making Christmas puddings. The day gained its name of 'stir-up Sunday' from the opening prayer of the day, "Stir up, we beseech thee, O Lord, the wills of thy faithful people". Children turned this into "Stir up we beseech thee, the pudding in the pot and when we get home we'll eat the lot". Everyone in the household had to stir the pudding, always easterly to westerly direction (because the Three Wise Men had come from the East) and make a wish; silver charms were put in the pudding mixture too to foretell the future of their recipients on Christmas Day.

CHRISTMAS EVE - Originally, this was the final fast day of the Advent season and was observed rigidly. No meat, cheese or eggs were eaten.

KILMINGTON ACT OF REMEMBRANCE

On an unusually warm and sunny day, crowds gathered at the War Memorial in Kilmington for the annual Act of Remembrance. Led by Royal British Legion Kilmington Branch Chaplain, Rev Julie Lomas, the service included Pastor Mike Hudson reading the names of those who died during the 1st and 2nd world wars, and the call to remember led by Commander Stafford Seward, under the watchful eye of RBL standard bearer Richard Norman. Wreaths were presented on behalf of the village and laid at the foot of the memorial by RBL Vice-Chairman, Peter Wood.

Earlier in the day St Giles' Church hosted the joint service of remembrance with The Baptist Church, Kilmington and members of the Royal British Legion in attendance. For the first time members of the newly formed 1st Kilmington Guides were present with their flag, and two Guides read the lesson.

The Christmas meal was a lavish affair with a wide selection of food/meat: poultry and fish for those who could afford it (roast turkey is a modern introduction; roast goose was once the centre piece). Mince pies, which featured a pastry Jesus in his crib, were made from a mixture of sweet fruits and minced meat.

Christmas went into decline during the 17th century when the Puritans banned Christmas for several years. It recovered when Charles Dickens wrote 'A Christmas Carol' in 1840.

'THE LIGHT SHINES IN THE DARKNESS...' (JOHN 1:5)

I'm a little bit strange. Perhaps that's an understatement! One of the reasons this is true, is because I traditionally prefer autumn and winter, to spring and summer.

Maybe it's because of the chronic hay fever I suffered with as a child, which made summer so burdensome. Knowing that the same hot weather that allowed me the freedom to be outside with my friends, would also mean swollen eyes, itchy skin, and uncomfortable congestion. Maybe it's because I think there is something refreshing about cold winter walks, wrapped up warm, with your breath hanging visibly in front of you. Or maybe it's because as an exserviceman who endured both the extremes of desert heat, and prairie cold, I find it's much easier to get warm than it is to cool yourself down... I still remember my Corporal at basic training telling us; "There is no such thing as bad weather, just bad dress!"

However, this year I am not looking forward to winter in the same way that I usually would. This year we head into a winter where we will see so many in our society struggle with both the cost of living crisis and rising energy prices. It seems unfathomable that in our modern society, where there is so much wealth, many people in our country will be facing the unimaginable choice between heating and eating this winter.

As a church family we are committed to helping anyone in our community who is struggling. We started our Warm Space community cafe initiative in November. This is open to anyone, for any reason. Whether it's a space to keep warm and enjoy a hot meal. Whether it's to get advice or signposting for agencies that might be able to assist with struggles. Whether it's to come and socialise with friends or make new ones. Or whether it's just to find a space of calm and peace in the busyness of life. Do feel free to make use of the space, invite others along, and even use it to host groups or gatherings. Our building is also open most days for anyone to drop in who might need help, support or a hot cup of tea. It's great to see so many other organisations offering similar facilities in the local area, including our friends at St Giles'.

As a Christian, I take great hope in the fact that I know that we do not face the challenges of this winter alone, that there is a God who loves us, is for us, and is with us. I left the Beacon one evening and looked back to see it beautifully flood-lit in the dark night's sky. It was a reminder to me of the Bible verse that will be quoted a lot as we approach Christmas this year; 'The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it.' (John 1:5)



It is a reminder that Jesus came into the world at Christmas to shine a light of hope into the darkness of the world. God in our midst, born not into a palace, but into relative poverty. To seek the lost and the hurting, and lead them into his love and safe keeping. It is a reminder that however dark it may seem, there is a greater hope and we are not alone.

And it is a reminder that we can so often shine that light for others, by looking out for one another and caring for the most vulnerable in our community this winter.


NEW WILDLIFE BOOK

Local naturalist and wildlife author, Michael Tyler, has written another book covering the birds of the Lower Axe Valley, including the renowned Seaton Wetlands. The book has been produced in partnership with East Devon District Council (EDDC).

Over 300 species of birds have been recorded and each is referred to in the book. The status of each species is listed, together with colour photographs and migration details of many birds ringed or recovered in the area.

After careful research of nineteenth century literature, the author gleaned considerable information on the status of the local birdlife, especially along the River Axe and its hinterland, which had not been published more recently.

The book covers a geological area extending from Branscombe to the Undercliff, north along the river valley to



the Dorset/Somerset border. A relatively small area, but it's surprising how full it is with birdlife.

This book will be of interest to local people who are proud of the local environment and its birdlife, as well as the historical ornithological information going back more than two centuries.

Michael Tyler has written several books and articles on natural history, including 'The Birds of Devon,' a complete avifauna of Devon and the award winning 'British Oaks - A Concise Guide'.

The hardback book is expected to be available from early December and copies priced at £15.00 can be purchased

and support and say how much they have been appreciated. Hopefully they can now sit back and just enjoy reading the Postscript rather than having to deliver it first.



EAST DEVON DRAFT LOCAL PLAN CONSULTATION – HAVE YOUR SAY!

The new Draft Local Plan sets out how EDDC intends to meet housing targets, to meet the needs of local residents up to 2040. It is the key document used in making planning

decisions in East Devon so it is vital that people have their say on proposals now. EDDC is seeking residents' views on specific sites for future development.

East Devon Local Plan 2020-2040 - Kilmington



In the Plan (see map above) the sites shown in Kilmington as 'accepted' in green reflect those we put forward in the Kilmington Neighbourhood Plan. There is also one additional proposed site shown in orange, the land to the west and southwest of The Old Inn, categorised as 'a Potential 2nd best choice allocation'. However, EDDC state that for this site it 'would be appropriate to look at heritage impacts in more detail.' Other sites, shown in red, proposed by landowners, developers etc. have been categorised as 'should not be allocated.'

The draft plan also outlines how the district plans to address the climate change emergency, how and where new jobs should be created, how town centres should be supported and how the district can protect built heritage and the natural environment. You can log on to the website and give your views for each of the proposed sites and add your comments on the other subjects in the draft plan. Your comments will be considered as EDDC develop the plan further. Everyone who lives, works, and spends time in the district has been asked to share their views about the future of the district as part of consultation which is now live.

Have your say on how many homes need to be built and where in East Devon, sharing your views on a new draft Local Plan. The consultation at https://eastdevonlocalplan.commonplace.is closes on Sunday, 15th January 2023.

NATIONAL HIGHWAYS A35 MEETING

Your Parish Council PC organised a meeting with National Highways (who are responsible for the A35) and a number of councils along the road from Bridport to Honiton were invited. The East Devon District Council's leader Councillor Paul Arnott and a representative from our MP Richard Foord's office also attended to add their support.

Two officers from National Highways (NH) gave a presentation and answered questions about the plans for the A35 and likely timing of work. They explained:

- A feasibility study is almost complete, and it was stated that Kilmington should get:
 - Village Gateways where physical signs, fence, village name boards and road markings will clearly define our village boundary
 - Average Speed Cameras at each end of the village which will track the average speed that a car travels between them.
 - A reduction in the speed limit from 50mph to 40mph (we were told a further reduction to 30mph is unlikely, but the PC will continue to make a case for this)
 - At least one Light Controlled Pedestrian Crossing to aid crossing the A35
- Timing for the project should be:
- 2022/early 2023 Completion and agreement of the feasibility study
 - 2023/2024 Detailed design work with some limited implementation of improvements starting to be phased in from late 2023 onwards.

- 2023/2024/2025/2026 Implementation of the entire project.
- The reason for some delay is that NH has changed the way they were looking at the A35, away from a 'village by village' approach to one where they consider the complete stretch of some 60 km from Dorchester to Honiton. Considering the whole route is a more effective way to work, as changes to one section impact on another. New signage, road markings etc. will be consistent along the whole stretch.
- At present they have a five-year budget which has been 'ring fenced' so funds should be available to complete the 60km project. However, these latest national financial issues could now result in 'emergency cuts.'
- Work along the road is split into two categories:
 - Safety Improvements which are prioritised according to official accident records
 - Severance Improvements (reducing the impact of the road cutting our parish in two) which are prioritised on inspection and other local information.

Therefore, the Parish Council can have little impact on bringing forward the Safety Improvements but, making a case with our local knowledge, might hasten the completion of the Severance work. We will therefore be working on this with NH.

Rest assured your Parish Council will continue our discussions in order to maximise any improvements along the A35 and introduce them as quickly as possible. We will keep you informed.

THE KILMINGTON COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION



If you have an idea for an event let us know. Some events will offer complementary benefits, some will be self-funding and, if they return a profit, this will be added to the fund. We also hope to grow the number of volunteers willing to lend a hand with future events so we can maintain our lively village community.




























































This month's recipes have been chosen with two things in mind; firstly Christmas of course and secondly, cutting back on food waste and making food go further. Every year I over buy-groceries, and after Christmas I am left with foods which need using up. These usually include cheese, cream, chocolate and sweet treats, so the following recipes aim to use up those ingredients. The savoury tart is really a good way of using up left over cheese and cream and can be served with salad as a supper dish or for a cheaper main meal. It works well with baked beans and a jacket potato. The pudding is

a tasty way of using up left over Panettone, cream and chocolate. The biscuits are quick and easy to make and can be frozen. I have also seen a recipe for Brandy Butter shortbread which sounds interesting too.

There are several useful websites which give good ideas for using up left over Christmas food; the recipes are numerous and include pies for left-over turkey and vegetables, Christmas pudding ice cream, Eccles cakes using up left-over dried fruit and marzipan. CHEESEBOARD AND ONION TART

Serves 4-6

Pastry:

250g/10oz plain flour

125g/5oz butter, cold and cubed

4 tbsp cold water

Filling:

1 large onion, thinly sliced into rings

2 tbsp olive oil

2 large eggs

300ml/12floz double cream

250g/10oz cheese, a third each of cheddar, brie and stilton works well, crumbled/torn

1 tsp of chopped parsley (optional)

Salt and pepper

Method

- 1. First make the pastry by pulsing the flour and butter together in a food processor. Add the water and pulse until a ball of dough is formed. Chill for 10 minutes.
- 2. Use the pastry to line a 23cm loose bottom flan tin, leave the excess pastry hanging over the edge of the tin. Line the pastry with greaseproof paper and baking beans. Bake at 180C fan/200C/ gas 6 C for 15 minutes. Remove the beans and paper and cook for a further 10 minutes. Trim off the excess pastry.
- 3. Whilst the pastry is cooking, heat the oil in a frying pan and cook the onions for approx 10 minutes until golden in colour and soft.
- 4. Scatter the onions on the pastry base followed by the cheeses.
- 5. Mix the eggs, cream, seasoning and parsley if using together and pour onto the cheeses.
- 6. Bake at 160C fan/180C/gas 4 for 35-40 minutes until set. Turn the temperature down to 140C if the pastry begins to brown too much



Serves 4-6

25g/1oz butter 300g/12oz Panettone, sliced 2 eggs 150ml/6floz double cream

225ml/9 floz milk

1 tsp vanilla essence

2 tbsp caster sugar

50g/2oz dark chocolate, chopped

Method

- 1. Grease an ovenproof dish with butter.
- 2. Spread the remaining butter over the Panettone slices and cut each slice into 3 pieces.
- 3. Lay the Panettone slices, butter side up, into the dish. Scatter over the chopped chocolate.
- 4. In a jug, beat together the cream, milk, eggs, caster sugar and vanilla essence. Pour over the Panettone slices.
- 5. Bake at 160C fan/180C/gas 4 for 35-40 minutes until set.
- 6. Serve with cream or ice-cream.

CLOTTED CREAM SHORTBREAD

Makes approx. 20 biscuits

100g/4oz unsalted butter, softened 100g/4oz clotted cream 100g/4oz caster sugar 300g/12oz plain flour

Method

- 1. Cream the butter, cream and sugar together until pale and fluffy. Stir in the flour and form into a ball.
- 2. Roll the dough out on to a floured surface to a thickness of a pound coin. Using a 7cm cutter cut out the biscuits. Re roll if necessary to use up all the dough.
- 3. Place on a greased or lined baking tray. Bake at 160C fan/180C/gas 4 for approx 25 minutes.
- 4. Once cooked, cool on a wire rack, dust with caster or

MAD moments in the garden

This, as some of you may know, is my last contribution to Postscript. Looking back, somewhat surprisingly it's my 63rd issue!! In January I move to pastures new and leave this lovely village and my garden behind. I'm moving to central Bristol, so back to city life and a much smaller patch which currently is very overgrown. Thankfully I am very excited about creating a different sort of garden there.

Back in the summer I started taking cuttings, realizing the move was on the cards, and now I am reaching the stage of digging up and dividing some favourite perennials, some to take, some to share with fellow gardeners and leaving most behind for the family arriving in January to enjoy.

There are some favourites, of course, that are too big to move and others that just won't grow well in Bristol. Rhododendron, Camellias and some other acid-loving plants will remain here undisturbed.

My apologies for the lack of the Christmas theme, but my head is full of getting sorted, gathering pots and plants into one area, sorting and slimming down the tool collection, all of which I want done before the last Devon Christmas with all the family. Once some packing is done and other things arranged, I can think Christmas. I hope you will find some inspiration from my favourite plants that will be travelling north with me. Given the size of the next garden project, the plants I am taking are my 'must find space somewhere for' plants.

Top of the list are Salvias. I seem to have accrued quite a collection. Thankfully they are easy to propagate. Three of the favourites are Salvia uliginosa, the tall willowy waving wands of the brightest clear sky-blue flowers is just so uplifting on a grey autumn day. I have planted it amongst

So suddenly the Christmas issue is here again. Geranium "Rozanne" which weaves its way over the Salvia's somewhat untidy base. The Aster x frikartii "Monch" completes the trio of differing blue tones appearing in June extending through to well, the first two plants are still flowering now as I write in mid-November!! So, I will be taking some of all three.

> One of the other favourite Salvias also in this bed is Salvia x sylvestris "Caradonna". These flowers, growing above a tidy neat mound of dark leaves, flower from late spring through to mid-summer. The dark purple flowers are held on stiff, dark purple stems that are a great contrast to the alliums both growing up above the slightly neater, at that stage in the season, Geranium "Rozanne" as it begins to flower. Dead heading will extend the season of flowering.

Number three, Salvia greggii "Royal Bumble" is a delicate woody shrub with masses of hot red flowers from June through to mid-November. These are borne on dark, purple green stems with similar coloured small scented leaves. Just beautiful.

I am as usual getting very close to my word count limit so must say goodbye. I have very much enjoyed writing these MAD moments, learning a lot along the way and always wanting to elaborate more than the space allows.

I am delighted to be handing over the column to Jane Chalk and Peter Guy in whose hands I am sure it will inform, entertain and encourage you all to do more gardening. Whatever the outcome this year, there is always next year to do it better or try something different. Happy gardening days to you all and have a great Christmas and a new year full of joy.





WILDLIFE OF THE COMMON AND SUMMER SIGHTINGS

Hi everyone - I'm back to write about Kilmington wildlife and its people, after a gap of six months. I was going to concentrate this month on our Common – the wildlife that was there, still is and maybe will come back.

However, before that – the Summer highlights: an otter sighted by the brook near the phone box, a young Sea Eagle in a garden at Shute Road - hard to imagine either 'visiting' the village but it happened! Sadly, a purple hairstreak, a butterfly rarely seen or recorded, drowned in our allotment pond, spotted and hoiked out by our eagle-eyed grandson. There had also been good numbers of the colourful, male Oak Eggar moth bombing around the village during daylight hours in August. They generally travel amongst large areas of tall grassland looking to pounce on females to mate with. This suggests that our verges are being seen as more connected and larger in extent. Formerly The Common would have been their prime breeding site when it covered approx. 250 acres!

The Common, as it is now, shrunk to a fragment and some of the distinctive life of this lowland heath is only just hanging on. The Summer flowers are clearly struggling, dwarfed by dominant grasses. The grasses, literally over-fed in recent years, have thrived on trapped leaves, cut grass and liberal amounts of fertiliser – dog-poo is most likely, in the absence of grazing animals. These grassy areas are going to need frequent cutting for some time. There was also the intense heat and the lack of rainfall to contend with, which we all had to endure! Despite our hard labour last winter, the brambles in places are too well-established, again due to several years of cutting, and have developed pruned tops above huge spreading roots that can only be removed by pickaxes and a fair amount of muscle power – great to keep you fit!

Despite these setbacks it was rewarding to see reasonable numbers of common blue butterfly, small copper and an occasional, large silver-washed fritillary using the south facing bank on the edge of the grassland for its patrol in our late Summer sunshine. The spring flowers on the woodland edge, not having so much competition, did well earlier in the year. Similarly, when Stafford carried out the first cut this Autumn, which is now raked off, there was the reward of seeing many species of fungi coming through – huge Penny Bun Boletes, The Blusher and The Miller, Death Cap, several Russula/ brittle cap species and numerous Waxcaps as well as the beautiful Amethyst Deceiver. At the moment just by the off-road parking at the top of Shute Road the Giant Funnel Caps fungi have reappeared.

Two flowers that were once found on the Common were Sawwort and Devils's Bit Scabious. I couldn't find them this year – do you have either in your garden? If so it would be great to have some seed and see if we can re-establish them. The additional Heath Lobelia re-introductions haven't worked – when we planted them, we didn't know exactly what we were facing but we will persevere and find the right place and management for them to flourish. Oh, lots of work to do but also great fun.
