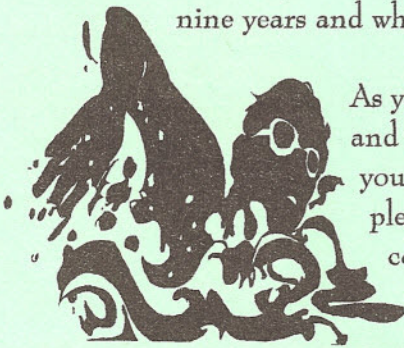
### Shute Theatre and Arts Guild (STAG)

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# BYGONE DAYS

Part of an issue of "The Deanery Magazine", dated February 1933, was passed to Post-script by Mr. Wakley of Meadowbank. The following extracts are taken from this issue and photographs relating to the 'new' bus service were also supplied by Mr. Wakley. We hope you will find it of interest and, for others, bring back some happy memories.

## KILMINGTON

The very sore state of distress into which many thousands of our own people settled in far west Canada have fallen through the absolute failure of harvest for several years, followed by last year's terrible slump in prices, has stirred us deeply. The Canadian Government are providing food and fuel and seed where most wanted, but we learnt from the agents of the Fellowship of the Maple Leaf, working amongst them, that there was a very great need of warm clothing, many possessing only things made from flour bags or mere cotton overalls. We have already heard from a number of the recipients of the 16 large parcels of warm things, which Kilmington has enabled us to send to them, expressing the greatest thanks and appreciation and I am sure there will be a great welcome for Miss Margaret Robertson (a F.M.L. worker home on furlough) who will give us a Lantern Lecture in the Church Schoolroom on Wednesday, February 8th, at 8 o'clock, descriptive of what is being done to help these pioneer kinsmen of ours and to alleviate the distress into which they have fallen through no fault of theirs.

## MEMBURY

January 11th is to be remembered as the day of arrival in Membury of the first Membury-owned motor bus. It will doubtless be running by the time this is in print, and we trust that Mr. S.J. Wakley will be well rewarded for his courageous effort to meet a public need.

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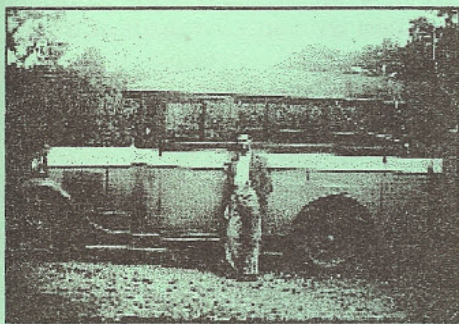
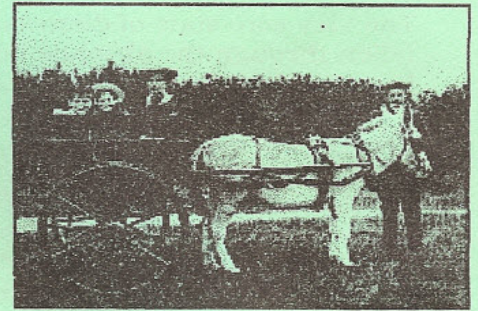

## LOCAL FOLKUS

Following on from the 'New' bus service story in 'Bygone Days', we have caught up with Mr. Wakley, now residing in Meadowbank, where he has been catching up on painting and woodworking in his well earned retirement. But, how did it come about and what happened to him and the bus service afterwards? Post-script asked him!

Mr. Wakley was brought up in Membury by a father who, after being injured in an industrial accident and unable to continue farm work, became the local 'Paper Boy', collecting newspapers from Axminster and delivering them by donkey cart around local villages. Here is a picture of Mr. Wakley, sitting in the 'governors car', with his sister and Mum and Dad. Mr. Wakley tells me he often used to accompany his Dad and, despite the fact that it took the best part of the day, he used to enjoy riding on the cart and helping with deliveries.



It certainly stood him in good stead for his future, as he started out with a taxi service in Membury servicing the local community. The 'bus' service got started when one market day it dawned on him that instead of spending the day running people back and forth in his car, he could offer a much better service if he ran a BUS instead of a taxi. This thought became a reality in February 1933. He started with trips to Axminster, Honiton and Chard markets, using one bus (see picture: a 1929, 14 seater, Ford) and, then as the business and demand grew other trips were arranged, building up to 7 or 8 buses, and so the first local coach tour company, 'Rambler Coaches', grew into existence.

Mr. Wakley moved with his wife, Marion, family and coaches to The Shrubbery in Axminster just after the war (this is now Leo's car park). The shed just to the right of Leo's, was the coach station and workshop (see photo) and the main car park was his garden. He wanted to expand and have a petrol station and car showroom, the planners wanted him to have this nearer his living premises, which would have meant knocking down the big Redwood tree. Mr. Wakley refused so the new premises were finally located approximately where the small car park to the front right is currently. The business was sold in 1963, and shortly after moving to Kilmington, in 1971, Mr. and Mrs Wakley were returning home from holiday and occasioned through Axminster, passing their old home only to find it no longer there. It was a shock they never really got over, he still feels sad about it now and he is even more pleased that he stood his ground when the business was extended as the Redwood is virtually the only original reminder of his Axminster home. Mr. Wakley paid tribute to his wife Marion, who sadly died 9th March last year, saying that "she was the woman behind the man", always helping and supporting both him and the business. He also wanted to say a big **thank you** to all their ex-employees. Mr. Wakley, consider it done!



A big thank you to you too Mr. Wakley for sharing part of your life with us.

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We personally found talking to Mr. Wakley about his life in the area very interesting and enlightening, especially the bit about Leo's car park, and we hope you enjoyed the read and the pictures. "You must be a boy who wants to go to space," said a low voice.

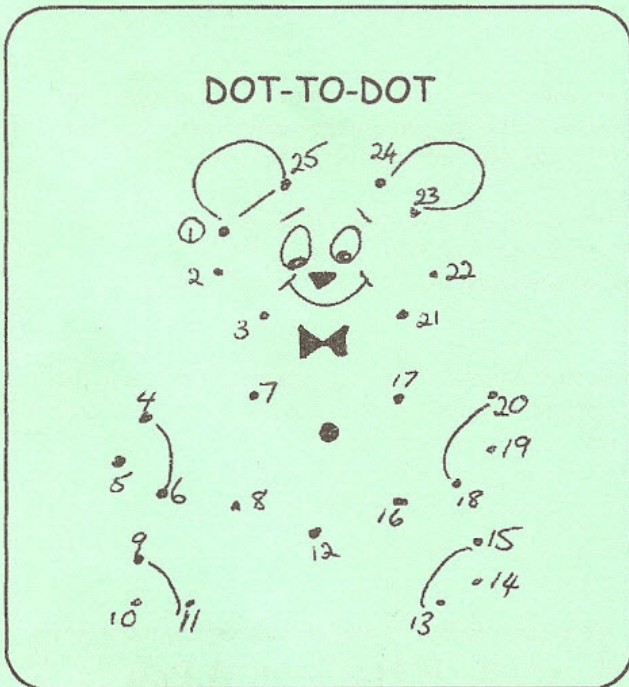
"Yes, I am" said the boy, "Who are you?".

"It doesn't matter" the voice answered.

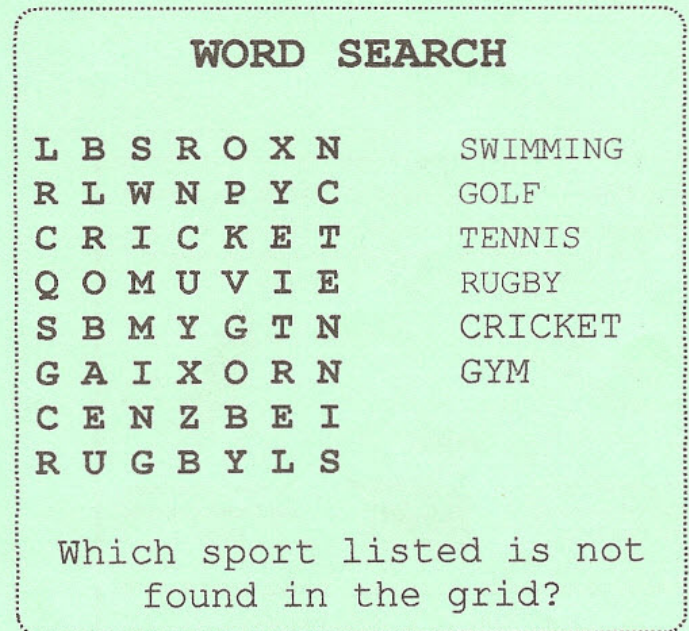
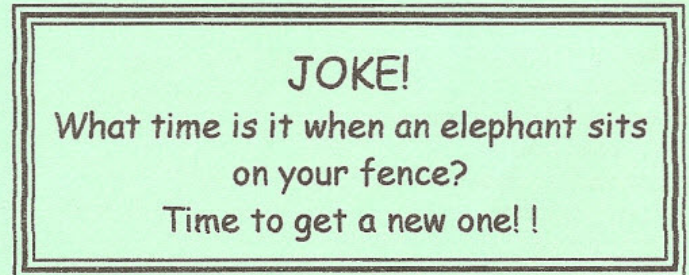

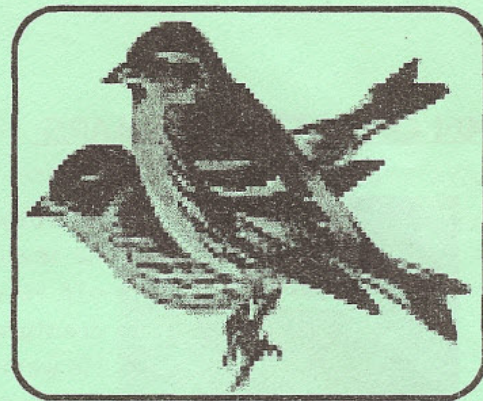

## Kilminster Birds

### 1. The Siskin

I make no apologies for beginning this series with an unusual little bird, as this is the time of year you might see this most attractive small finch. It is smaller than the Greenfinch and female Chaffinch with which it can be confused at first sight or from a distance. The male has a distinctive black cap and bib with brightly coloured yellow and green wing plumage and tail feathers. The female has similar but more delicate colours. Length 4 3/4 inches, about the size of a Goldfinch but an inch shorter than the Greenfinch.



My first sighting was on December 30th, earlier than usual, on the nuts hanging close to the house. There they defend their position aggressively against the many Tits by partially opening their wings and their beaks. Two or three usually feed for a few minutes before disappearing back to the conifers. They depart for their breeding grounds in early to mid April. A few pairs nest in the conifer plantations on Dartmoor, most return to Scandinavia, but there is always the possibility of their breeding in the plantations on Shute Hill. Nests are virtually impossible to spot, being tiny, compact and built on a branch high up in a conifer, usually a spruce.

## KITCHEN KAPERS

### TUNA FISH FLAN - Mrs Burton of Shute Rd.

#### Ingredients (serves 2-4)

1lb potatoes, boiled  
small tin tuna\* or  
8oz cooked flaked white fish  
1 dsp chopped onion  
1 egg, separated (white to be whipped)  
1/4 pint milk/fish stock  
2 oz butter/margarine  
salt and pepper  
1 tsp tomato puree  
chopped parsley  
1 oz plain flour

#### Method

Drain boiled potatoes and cream in mixer with 1 oz butter, egg yolk and seasoning. Grease 8" flan dish and shape potato mixture in dish like a flan. Bake in moderately hot oven for 15 minutes.

Cook onion till tender in fat. Remove from fat and add flour to fat, slowly add milk to make a sauce. Add seasoning, tomato puree, parsley, onion and drained tuna/fish and lastly fold in whipped egg white.

Remove potato flan from oven and carefully place fish mixture in flan. Bake in middle of moderately hot oven for a further 20 minutes, until top is golden brown.

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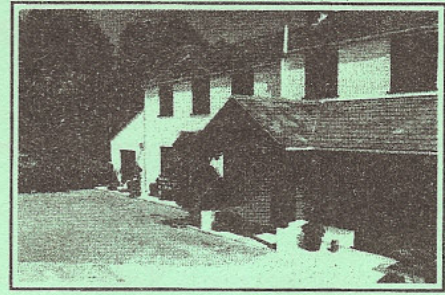
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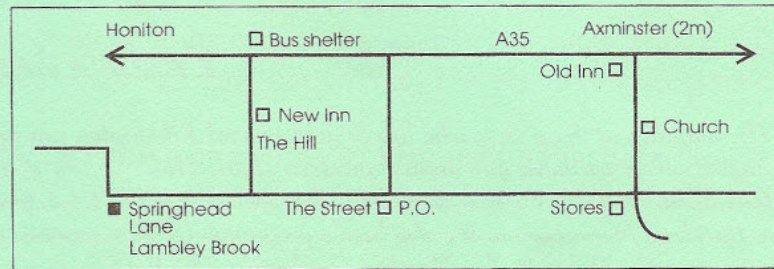
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## Culture Club!

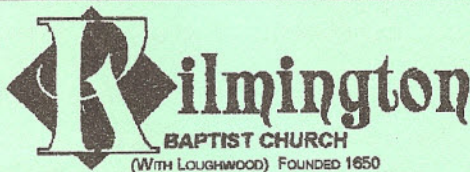
And Noah kissed the Earth and said: " Lord, Lord, thou knowest in thy wisdom what it is like with delivery dates."

## Letter from The Manse

*"Without wood a fire goes out;  
without gossip a quarrel dies down.  
The words of a gossip are like choice morsels;  
they go down to a man's inmost parts."  
(Proverbs 26, verses 20 & 22 - The Bible)*

When Jan asked me to consider writing an article for Kilmington PostScript, the idea of a regular column was suggested: "Thought for the Month", maybe? Or even a "Gossip column" ?

Doubtless, we have all been the victims of gossip from time to time. (Of course, we are never the one who initiates gossip, are we?) Being on the receiving end of gossip is no fun and in a village, gossip is a bigger problem than in a town. Most people know many other people, and in many cases are related to each other (a problem that ministers and vicars need to be especially aware of!) In my previous village, Weston, in Northamptonshire, there were only 48 houses, 4 farms, the Baptist Chapel and the Pub, so everyone knew everyone else. You could not have secrets in Weston! Gossip is dynamite!

Kilmington, however, is too big a village for everyone to know everyone else, or everything that is going on. That's why I think that the idea of a village newsletter is an excellent one. Perhaps this is an effective way of communicating information, news and views. The Concise Oxford Dictionary defines gossip as "idle talk, groundless rumours". Gossip destroys relationships in a community, as the wise proverbs of Solomon make clear, but clear communication of news and ideas must surely help to build a stronger community. To that end, I support PostScript, and hope that Kilmington might become a better village as a result.

So, perhaps in future editions of PostScript, we shall look at some other Proverbs. There are some real gems in this book of the Bible - plenty more fuel for provocative "Thoughts of the Month".
